In December 1989, I witnessed my first snow in this county. Our oldest daughter was just two weeks old and we were preparing our Christmas visits to both sides of the family when we walked outside our home and saw the small flakes of snow begin to fall. It snowed throughout the night and we woke up to six to eight inches of snow. This past Friday night, the snow returned — 20 years later. I am glad this is a very infrequent occurrence, but it was exciting to call my friends and tell them that it was snowing in Bluffton.

Rain barrel/rain garden program

This week, I want to highlight an important program, supportive of the town, relating to our environment — the rain barrel/rain garden program. This is an initiative aimed at reducing non-point source pollution as part of the May River Watershed Action Plan and is a major component of the 3-year Section 319 grant won by the town in 2009.

Currently the target area for this retrofit project is in the Historic District. The town chose this area because it is a highly visible setting for this type of small-scale environmental retrofit that will directly affect the stormwater runoff to the May River. By installing these rain barrels and/or rain gardens, these businesses and residents can reduce the amount of stormwater and the pollutants it carries that leaves their property, and will create a more vibrant, sustainable community that will retain its character while increasing the quality of life for all of us and celebrating the May River.

Residents and businesses within the Historic District can receive all necessary rain barrel equipment as well as materials to plant a rain garden. A number of the Historic District's businesses have signed on, including Preston Studios, Reclamation by Design and Maye River Gallery.
