STATUS OF HURRICANE MATTHEW RECOVERY PROCESS

Deputy County Administrator / Special Counsel Josh Gruber stated 1.7 million cubic yards of debris has been picked up so far and an estimate of 250,000 remains. There is no update on marine debris removal. The County received written notification from both the Department of Natural Resources and the Department of Health and Environmental Control, that neither agency believes they are responsible nor has the resources to engage in marine debris pickup. We are awaiting a response from the Attorney General's Office for an opinion we sought from them. We are moving forward with the Request for Proposals for a marine debris contractor in the event it becomes the County's responsibility. Discussion: Mr. Fred Leyda, Director, Human Services Alliance, provided the Committee an update on individual assistance for residents and survivors during Hurricane Matthew and ongoing. The call center at United Way of the Lowcountry (United Way) continues to receive calls. We are currently up to 13,016 referrals connecting families with resources. The highest needs include food, utility assistance, rental assistance and home repairs. Food is listed as an area we are struggling with; but, we are doing well with our food pantries. What is happening is there is a segment of the population that is not accustomed to help. When they call for help, they are not accustomed to being sent to a food pantry. The United Way relief fund is up to

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\$37,445 for hurricane relief. The challenge there is getting folks outside of our local area to donate. We are steady with the current number of volunteers and there has been approximately 100 hours of additional volunteer work.

Mr. Leyda spoke about case management and how to follow up on cases. We have been informed by the State, that they will be designating an agency that will be responsible for case management. In talking to other communities that have had to deal with this, have said to be careful due to the inability to find out the outcome of these cases. We need some ongoing case management.

Discussion: Mr. Rob McFee, Division Director–Facilities and Construction Engineering, reviewed this item with the Committee. As a result of damage from Hurricane Matthew, Beaufort County advertised for competitive bids for the construction repair/re-establishment of slopes adjacent to marshlands at two sites. These two sites are: Site 1 – Approximately 1,200 feet

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of roadway slope on U.S. Highway 278 westbound on the approach to the Bluffton Parkway Flyover Bridge. Site 2 – Approximately 1,000 feet of repurposed railway bed slope on the Spanish Moss Trail Phase 2 between North Street and bridge over Battery Creek.

The Engineering Department analyzed bid prices of Jeffers Construction, Inc., Hardeeville, South Carolina, and Quality Enterprises USA, Inc., Chesapeake, Virginia. Jeffers Construction did not submit a bid price for Site 1. The Engineering Department is recommending that the subject bid be awarded in total to Quality Enterprises USA, Inc., Chesapeake, Virginia, with a total bid price for both sets of \$543,550. Staff is requesting a 10% project contingency of \$54,355, making the total of \$597,905 (\$279,015 for Site 1 and \$318,890 for Site 2).

Funding is as follows:

Site 1 – Bluffton Parkway Flyover Bridge approach total budget of \$279,015 with funding from Bluffton Parkway Phase 5, Account 47010012-54500 with an available balance of \$1.3 million.

Site 2 – Spanish Moss Trail Phase 2 slope total budget of \$318,890 with funding from Spanish Moss Trail Phase 2, Account 48060011-54435 with an available balance of \$186,564 and the remainder of \$132,326 from Local 3% Accommodations Tax with an unobligated available fund balance of \$1.7 million.

A request to FEMA for reimbursement of applicable costs will be submitted.

Discussion: Mr. Rob McFee, Division Director–Facilities and Construction Engineering, reviewed this item with the Committee. Pinckney Island National Wildlife Refuge consists of 4.053 acres on Pinckney Island in southern Beaufort County. The only access point to the island is its intersection with U.S. Highway 278. The purpose of this project is to improve access safety by providing a grade separated access to Pinckney Island. The annual visitation to the refuge is almost 200,000 visitors per year. Traffic volumes on U.S. Highway 278 exceed 55,000 vehicles per day and the posted speed limit is 55 mph. These volumes, combined with the speed of traffic along U.S. Highway 278 and the existing geometry of the entrance, make entry to and exit from the refuge difficult. In 2010, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service conducted a transportation study report to identify viable alternatives to improve this safety issue. The report identified the preferred alternative as a grade separated access that would close the median on U.S. Highway 278 and provide an underpass in order to enter the refuge. Construction cost estimates are approximately \$1,750,000. In order to finalize the environmental permitting, provide agency coordination, the design and construction documents, and an appropriation of \$250,000 is requested from the County's Hospitality Tax Fund with an available balance of \$4.7 million.

6. Consideration of Contract Award / 2017-2018 Workers' Compensation Broker Services (Fully Insured vs. Self-Insured)

Discussion: Mr. Gary Kubic, County Administrator, introduced this item to the Committee. Workers' compensation is a major portion of our general fund budget. Administration is here to provide Council with options regarding workers' compensation services. Currently, we are with the South Carolina Association of Counties (SCAC) who operate and control a trust fund for workers' compensation. Council's position today will have an impact on our relationship with SCAC. A 90-day notice of provisions to the current contract will need to be provided in the event of any change. He introduced County Attorney Tom Keaveny to provide a historical recap of this item.

Mr. Keaveny introduced the new Risk Management Director Mr. Kyle Jackson, who replaced Mrs. Miriam Mitchell.

After the 2016 Retreat, Mr. Keaveny participated in a committee to evaluate a Request for Payment to explore the possibility of changing workers' compensation coverage from fully-insured to self-insured. He learned in that process the amount of the claims made on an annual basis, to include all expenses, as well as the annual premiums paid to SCAC.

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- 2010 claims paid totaled \$1.29 million and premiums totaled \$2.13 million.
- 2011 claims paid totaled \$1.2 million and premiums totaled \$2.094 million.
- 2012 claims paid totaled \$1.1 million and premiums totaled \$1.8 million.
- 2013 claims paid totaled \$1.1 million and premiums totaled \$2.1 million.
- 2014 claims paid totaled \$534,000 and premiums totaled \$2,179,000

The County endeavored to see what options were available by way of self-insurance, as well as the stance of others in South Carolina. We learned, both Greenville County and Aiken counties are self-insured and have been for numerous years. In order to transition to self-insured, you hire a broker, who hires a third-party administrator (TPA) to cover up to a certain level. The County could probably realize an approximate \$1 million savings a year transiting from fully-insured to self-insured. This is a significant amount of mortey and seemed to be worth exploring.

Mr. Kyle Jackson, Risk Management Director, and Mr. Scott Thomason, Arthur J. Gallagher Human Resources & Compensation Consulting, presented to the Committee a PowerPoint Presentation on Fully-Insured versus Self-Insured services.

Self-insurance is a well-designed plan in which an organization pays its own losses through a combination of a self-insured retention, buffer layer coverage and an excess layer of coverage. Companies and public entities alike in recent decades have turned to self-insured options for greater control over their losses and the benefits of cost differential potential. These include the following: Aiken County, Richland County, University of South Carolina, Greenville School District, City of North Myrtle Beach, Beaufort County School District and Charleston County School District Characteristics of good self-insured candidates include high claim frequency, low claim severity, and extended payout schedules.

In a fully insured program, the insurance carrier assumes all the risk with agreed upon deductions. The premiums paid are based off the total payroll and a rolling three-year loss history that makes up a unique modification factor (MOD) number. The MOD number, for example, can range from .65 up to 1.60. That MOD number can either be a 65% discount or a 60% debit depending on the loss history and the premiums paid. A fully insured program does offer deductible options, but premiums are still subject to the rates and the MOD number.

Discussion: Mr. Josh Gruber, Deputy County Administrator/Special Council, reviewed this item with the Committee We are beginning to wrap-up the debris collections from the roadways in the County. The goal is to have it complete by the end of February. The County has been working with the private communities that were affected by the storm and the debris piles created by the community prior to FEMA approval for the private property debris removal. A number of communities, reacting to the storm and cleaning the roads and stockpiling the debris, preceded prior to County receiving the approval process.

According to County Council's Proclamation to declare a health emergency, we are directed to remove this debris from these communities. We have identified these piles of debris that need to be removed from these communities to include Fripp Island, Dataw Island, Moss Creek and Rose Hill. The total cost is approximately \$300,000.

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In addition, Mr. Gruber provided the Committee a brief update on storm-related costs to date, estimated non-reimbursable costs, status of the reserve fund, and estimated cost of debris cleanup within municipalities.

Mr. Keaveny updated the Committee on marine debris. In order to be eligible for FEMA reimbursement, the County must have a legal responsibility to remove the debris. There is debris from the high tide mark in the water. The Coastal Zone Management Act (CZMA) seems to say the land from the mean high tide mark to the sea belongs to the State. Neither the Ocean and Coastal Resource Management (OCRM) or the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) would take responsibility for cleanup and denied responsibility. The Emergency Management Division asked OCRM and DNR to put in writing their positions on the legal responsibility of cleaning that area. They both said it was not their responsibility under the statute. With that, the County asked the Attorney General for an expedited opinion. The County received their opinion, which said, under the Home Rule Act and South Carolina Constitution, that the County has the responsibility to clean the debris from the mean high tide mark to the low tide mark. Now we can move into the public assistance program where we receive FEMA reimbursement. A Request for Proposals (RFP) was sent out and, hopefully, we have some bidders. Next, we will hire a contractor and get this marine debris picked up.

Mr. Keaveny also spoke about the issue of abandoned boats. He has been in contact with the Chief Counsel for DNR and there is a whole process to have boats declared abandoned. That process has begun. The boats have been identified and tagged. Boats that no one claims within 90 days will become abandoned.

Mr. Keaveny spoke about the debris in the waterway. The Coast Guard said it is their responsibility to clean the debris from the unnavigable waters. They said they have cleaned the waterways. The County does not plan to get into the waterway and clean up marine debris. The County plans to adhere to the Attorney General Opinion and clean debris from the mean high tide mark to the low-tide mark.

This is Workshop #2 for the purposes of discussing a potential ordinance to allow nighttime use of golf carts in designated portions of the County. At the previous workshop, the Committee discussed the following conditions: limiting hours, penalties, lighting requirements,

insurance requirements, modifications, and inspection process. Today's workshop is to discuss enhanced safety equipment available for golf carts and to receive comment from the golf cart community. He introduced Mr. Ben Andrews, representing Club Car, and Bruce Simmons, representing Quality Golf Carts, to speak before the Committee.

Mr. Andrews and Mr. Simmons informed the Committee that there is no standardization for golf carts. Some have lights while others do not. They spoke of personal transportation vehicle (PTV) kits that contain the necessary safety equipment for on-road use as well as the speed limit for this particular class of vehicle. The permitting process to use golf carts on the road, currently does not include any inspection process, just proof of ownership and liability insurance.

Discussion and concerns of the Committee members, staff and representatives of the various municipalities were as follows:

- The importance of lighting at night. The standard tail lights are not bright enough.
 - o The possibility of requiring a third light bar on the roof with turn signals, brake lights, and LED illumination.
- Cost of third light bar.
 - o Less than \$100.
- Safety concern relative to seatbelt use.
 - o Lap belts can be installed on all golf carts. It is a liability though without manufacture approval.
- City of Beaufort residents want nighttime use of golf carts. The City intends on listening to the safety requirements and is interested in this item moving forward.
- Town of Bluffton has adopted a resolution to accept any ordinance approved by Beaufort County Council allowing nighttime use of golf carts.
- Individuals need to understand the insurance needed to operate golf carts on secondary roads, is a special insurance, and is not covered under the homeowner's policy.
- If the County passes an ordinance allowing nighttime use of golf carts, who would have jurisdiction to enforce the requirements?
 - o The County has the jurisdiction to enforce. The municipality would have something in order to enforce within the municipality.
- The possibility of creating a working group with the municipalities to draft a proposed ordinance.
- The desire of county and municipalities' staff to work together to draft a proposed ordinance.
- Concerns with golf cart parking locations.
- Concern relative to the safety of driving golf carts on unlit roads.
- Restricting nighttime use of golf carts between midnight and 5:00 a.m.

Sheriff Tanner informed the Committee that both the Jekyll Island Authority and city of Brunswick, Georgia have similar ordinances regulating the use of golf carts on secondary roads. These ordinances include regulations on child restraints, seatbelt use, lighting, signals, mirrors,

and are very detailed. The City of Brunswick is the only governmental entity he has found that allows nighttime use of golf carts, and it is limited to one hour after sunset.

The Stormwater Section utilizes the bush hog to maintain our stormwater drainage system by mowing the workshelfs and ditches. The old bush hog will be

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sold at auction. Total cost of \$129,468 includes all discounts, delivery, South Carolina sales taxes, manuals, installation, and a basic warranty. Funding would come from account 50250011-54200, Stormwater Utility Fund, Specialized Capital Equipment.

Discussion: Mr. Rob McFee, Division Director- Facilities and Construction Engineering, reviewed this item with the Committee. The Engineering Department Right of Way staff has been researching ownership of a boat landing/beach access and a 50-foot right of way located at 51 Bay Point Road in Lands End Subdivision on St. Helena Island. This lot in question has no parcel identification number and has never been taxed. Property owners bordering 51 Bay Point Road appear to be encroaching on the 50-foot right of way and are decreasing public access to the landing. The Rhett Street 50-foot right of way is referenced in plat book 13 at page 100. Rhett Street no longer exists, but the parcel and encroachment are more clearly identified on a survey completed by Gasque and Associates Inc., dated December 16, 2016. A map showing the location and the bordering neighbors has been provided. County staff can find no official conveyance documentation of the lot in question; however, County Council minutes going back as far as 1969 reference the landing off of Rhett Road and the County has provided maintenance on landings and walkways in the Lands End Subdivision.

The Engineering Department recommends that County Council authorize the filing of a legal action to establish a 50 foot right of way prescriptive easement for 51 Bay Point Road to ensure continued public beach/boat landing access.

6. Consideration of Daufuskie Island Cooperative, Inc. Lease and Marshside Mama Sublease Agreements

Discussion: Mrs. Allison Coppage, Assistant County Attorney, reviewed this item with the Committee. Beaufort County entered into a lease with the Daufuskie Island Cooperative, Inc., (Cooperative) on May 13, 2010 for the use of two buildings (1,600 square feet), to be used

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as a general store and a restaurant. The Cooperative subleases that property to Marshside Mama and collects rents in the amount of \$600 a month. The lease expired December 31, 2015, but they have been continuing on a month-to-month lease. In meeting with the Daufuskie Island Cooperative and legal counsel, the Cooperative would like to renew the lease agreement on similar terms.

The County had its independent auditor look at the rents received by the Cooperative from Marshside Mama during the lease terms and there is about \$15,000 in rents not paid. The Cooperative said they gave a credit to Marshside Mama for improvements to the property that amounted to \$15,000. The Cooperative could not be here today to speak on that due to transportation issues.

Mr. Dawson wanted to know what is being changed in this lease to address the current problems the community has with Marshside Mama.

Mrs. Coppage said it would be the will of Council to provide suggested language to include into the drafting of the lease to alleviate current concerns.

Mr. Gary Kubic, County Administrator, stated Daufuskie Island is an interesting situation where Beaufort County indirectly is in the bar business. The location is where the County dock is located. We do want to encourage community days and activities there. All of Council has had the ability to see the deficiencies of the building and the restrooms. Staff has been working on ways to correct that. When we found that money exchange, per the lease agreement, may not have adequate documentation, an audit was commissioned. There have been several letters from Daufuskie residents received where they do not want to see Marshside Mama displaced. Once we receive the financial exchange identified and if we discover any deficiencies, those deficiencies will have to be recovered or known. Once we get the building codes information, it is expected that we are indirectly inviting the public into an inferior building, and we will have to make it proper. Also, the restrooms are deficient and will need upgrading. If we are entertaining a sublease, there is a process we use for requesting proposals.

Questions and concerns of the Committee included the following:

- If a capital improvement is needed, who is responsible?
 - o In this lease, it is a combination of responsibilities. The subtenant is liable for maintaining in good and working order as well as a list of repairs that needed to be done by the tenant.
 - o Staff recommends that the County not to take on that responsibility.
- Restrooms for Daufuskie Days.
 - o Since an incident of many years ago, additional porta toilets have been sent over.

8. Discussion / Replacement of Hilton Head Island Bridges

Discussion: Mr. Colin Kinton, Division Director—Transportation Engineering, provided the Committee an overview of this item. On Friday, January 13, 2017, the Lowcountry Area Transportation Study Metropolitan Planning Organization endorsed spending \$2 million toward completing the environmental assessment for the widening of U.S. Highway 278 between Moss Creek and Squire Pope Road. It was approved subject to Beaufort County entering into an Intergovernmental Agreement with South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) for the reimbursement of the \$2 million and funding for the entire project.

Committee Chairman Stu Rodman spoke about bridges. His understanding is that one of the Hilton Head Island bridges is at the end of its useful life, and the other has approximately 30 years of remaining life. Both the SCDOT and the federal government are looking at improving the inefficient bridge. If it is determined that the other three bridges are inadequate, the case can be made to replace. This goes beyond the Environmental Study. It looks at traffic, congestion, etc. This is a three-year study.

Mr. Kinton stated the total cost of the project is approximately \$200 million. SCDOT has secured \$44 million for replacement of the one bridge and is asking the County to come up with the other \$156 million.

Mr. Kubic stated the Environmental Assessment three-year period concerned Administration due to the pursuit of general bonding for our projects, and did not want to be delayed. Staff has achieved that agreement with SCDOT. There are some engineering hypotheticals with Mackey Bridge, and what can and cannot be done with the current integrity of the original spans holding up the roadway pavement. The work we are doing as a County with

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SCDOT on this matter is very open, and he has been impressed with the State's desire to include all parties in discussions on how to proceed. They are cognizant of a comprehensive corridor review. What is troubling is the State paying \$44 million and the balance being a County responsibility. It is not the County's Administration's position currently. The 80:20 does not seem fair. Hilton Head Island, through its tourist magnet and all of the income that is generated for the State as a result, clearly, from an economic standpoint, those bridges are very vital to the State for potential revenue production.

Beaufort County Administration had a meeting with SCDOT and talked about funding possibility to get the \$2 million and talked about the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO). Possible sources of revenue talked about to include. CTC, Town of Hilton Head Island, free balance of 2006 Sales Tax Funds, TAG Funds, County Hospitality Tax, Impact Fees, and applying for a loan or grant through the State Infrastructure Bank. The suggestion from the meeting was to have a team meeting to include County Council, Town of Hilton Head Island and State Legislative Delegation to discuss and decide what to present to SCDOT.

As a result of damage from Hurricane Matthew, Beaufort County advertised for competitive bids for the construction repair/re-establishment of slopes adjacent to marshlands at two sites. These two sites are:

- Site 1 Approximately 1,200 ft of roadway slope on US 278 westbound on the approach to the Bluffton Parkway Flyover Bridge.
- Site 2 -Approximately 1,000 ft of repurposed railway bed slope on the Spanish Moss Trail Phase 2 between North Street and bridge over Battery Creek.

On 1/12/17, the following contractors submitted bids.

The Engineering Department analyzed both Jeffers Construction and Quality Enterprises bid prices. As shown above, Jeffers Construction did not submit a bid price for Site 1. The Engineering Department is recommending that the subject bid be awarded in total to Quality Enterprises who bid on both sites in the amount of \$543,550 as both locations need to be repaired as soon as possible and Quality Enterprises' bid will accomplish that.

Staff is requesting a 10% project contingency of \$54,355. Total project budget is \$597,905 which is a budget of \$279,015 for Site 1 and a budget of \$318,890 for Site 2.

FUNDING.

Site 1 - Bluffton Parkway Flyover Bridge approach total budget of \$279,015 with funding from Bluffton Parkway Phase 5 Acet #47010012-54500 with an available balance of \$1.3 million at January 31, 2017.

Site 2 - Spanish Moss Trail Phase 2 slope total budget of \$318,890 with funding from Spanish Moss Trail Phase 2 Acct #48060011-54435 with an available balance of \$186,564 and the remainder of \$132,326 from Local 3% Accommodations Tax with an unobligated available fund balance of \$1.7 million at January 31, 2017. The construction of the Spanish Trail Phase 2 was funded partially from Local A Tax as per Attachment #2.

A request to FEMA for reimbursement of applicable costs will be submitted.

RECOMMENDATION. The Finance Committee approve and recommend to County Council approval of:

- 1) a contract award to Quality Enterprises, USA, Inc., for the construction repair/re-establishment of marsh side slopes at the approach to westbound Bluffton Parkway Flyover Bridge and the Spanish Moss Trail Phase 2 between North Street and Battery Creek in the amount of \$543,550 from the accounts listed above:
- 2) the use of Local A Tax for the remaining budget of \$132,326 to fund the slope repairs on the Spanish Moss Trail Phase 2 and;
- 3) Recommend approval of a 10% contract contingency totaling \$54,355.

ORDINANCE 2017 / ___

AN ORDINANCE TO RATIFY CERTAIN ACTIONS OF THE BEAUFORT COUNTY COUNCIL AND TO UPDATE CHAPTER 18 OF ARTICLE III (BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONAL LICENSE)

WHEREAS, on May 22, 2014 Beaufort County Council Adopted Ordinance No. 2014/11 to adopt the National American Industry Classification System as promulgated by the Office of Management and Budget and published in the Federal Register; and

WHEREAS, certain SIC Codes remain within the body of the ordinance; and

WHEREAS, in order to provide a clear and accurate legislative record, it is deemed appropriate and necessary to affirm the actions of Beaufort County Council Committees thereby curing any perceived scrivener's errors.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF BEAUFORT COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA; AND IT IS HEREBY ORDERED ORDAINED BY AND UNDER THE AUTHORITY OF THE SAID COUNTY COUNCIL, AS FOLLOWS:

NOTE: <u>Underlined and boldface typed</u> portions indicate additions to the County Code. <u>Stricken</u>-portions indicate deletions to the County Code.

Sec. 18-46. - Purpose.

The business license levied by this article is for the purpose of providing such regulation as may be required by the business subject thereto and for the purpose of raising revenue to provide ad valorem tax relief. Each license shall be issued for one calendar year beginning on January 1 and shall expire on December 31; this time period shall be considered a license year. The provisions of this article and the rates herein shall remain in effect from year to year as amended by Beaufort County Council.

(Ord. No. 2014/11, 5-12-2014)

Sec. 18-47. - Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Business means a calling, occupation, profession or activity engaged in with the object of gain, benefit or advantage, either directly or indirectly. In addition to the above-described activities constituting doing business in the county, an individual shall be deemed to be in business if that individual owns and rents two or more residential rental units (or partial interest therein) within the county, excluding the municipalities therein. This applies to both short-term and long-term rentals.

Charitable purpose means benevolent, philanthropic, patriotic, or eleemosynary purpose which does not result in personal gain to a sponsor, organizer, officer, director, trustee or person with ultimate control of the organization. Charitable organization shall be deemed a business subject to a license tax unless the entire net proceeds of its operation, after necessary expenses, are devoted to charitable purposes. Compensation in any form to a sponsor, organizer, officer, director, trustee or person with ultimate control of the organization shall not be deemed a necessary operating expense.

Classification means that division of businesses by major groups subject to the same license rate, as determined by a calculated index of ability to pay based on national averages, benefits, equalization of tax burden, relationship of services, or other basis deemed appropriate by county council.

County means the County of Beaufort, South Carolina.

Gross receipts means the total revenue of a business, received or accrued, for one calendar or fiscal year collected or to be collected by the businesses, excepting income from business done wholly outside of the unincorporated area of the county and fully reported to a municipality or other county. The term "gross receipts" means the value proceeding or accruing from the sale of tangible business personal property, including merchandise and commodities of any kind and character and all receipts, by the reason of any business engaged in, including interest, dividends, discounts, rentals of real estate or royalties, without deduction on the account of the cost of the property sold, the cost of the materials used, labor or service cost, interest paid, or any other expenses whatsoever and without any deductions on account of losses. Gross income for business license purposes, may be verified by inspection of returns filed with the Internal Revenue Service, the South Carolina Department of Revenue, the South Carolina Insurance Commission, or other government agency. In case of brokers or agents, gross income means commissions received or retained, unless otherwise specified. Gross income for insurance companies means gross premiums collected. Gross income for business license tax purposes shall include the value of bartered goods and/or trade-in merchandise.

License official means the county employee, or other individuals, designated by the county administrator to perform the duties set forth in this article.

Person means any individual, firm, partnership, LLP, LLC, cooperative nonprofit membership, corporation, joint venture, association, estate, trust, business trust, receiver, syndicate, holding company or other group or combination acting as a unit, in the singular or plural, and the agent or employee having charge or control of a business in the absence of the principals.

Wholesaler means a business where the product the business sells is to be resold (retailed); where the supplier is truly a wholesaler, a business license is not required, however, if a warehouse or place of business is maintained in the county, or if a product is sold to an end user, its ultimate customer, a business license is required. Therefore, paper goods distributors who sell supplies to hotels and building supply distributors who sell to contractors or owners for buildings under construction are required to obtain a business license. Such distributors' customers are the end users of the products.

Sec. 18-48. - Administration.

The license official shall administer the provisions of this article, collect license taxes, issue licenses, make or initiate investigations and audits to ensure compliance, initiate denial or revocation procedures, report violators to code enforcement, produce forms, make reasonable regulations relating to the administration of this article, and perform such other duties as may be assigned by the county administrator.

(Ord. No. 2014/11, 5-12-2014)

Sec. 18-49. - Violations.

Any persons violating any provision of this article shall be deemed guilty of an offense and subject to a fine of up to \$500.00 or imprisonment for not more than 30 days or both, upon conviction. Each day of violation shall be considered a separate offense. Punishment for violation shall not relieve the offender of liability for delinquent taxes, penalties and costs provided for in this article.

Sec. 18-50. - License required.

Every person engaged or intending to engage in any calling, business, occupation or profession whether listed in the rate classification index or not, shall register the business and make application for a business license and will be required to pay an annual license tax and obtain a business license as provided in this article. A new business shall be required to have a business license prior to operation within the county.

(Ord. No. 2014/11, 5-12-2014)

Sec. 18-51. - License tax.

- (a) The required license tax shall be paid for each business subject to this article according to the applicable rate classification on or before May 31 in each year, except for those businesses in Rate Class 8 for which a different due date is specified.
- (b) A separate license shall be required for each place of business and for each classification of business conducted at one place. If gross income cannot be separated for classifications at one location, the license tax shall be computed on the combined gross income for the classification requiring the highest rate.
- (c) A license tax based on gross income shall be computed on the gross income for the preceding calendar or fiscal year, and on a 12-month projected income based on the monthly average for a business in operation for less than one year. The tax for a new business shall be computed on the estimated probable gross income stated in the license application for the balance of the calendar year. No refund shall be made for a business that is discontinued, annexed into a municipality or has rendered an overpayment of a prior year license tax.

(Ord. No. 2014/11, 5-12-2014)

Sec. 18-52. - Effective date.

The business license tax shall be implemented on an annual basis for calendar year 2000 and all subsequent years. The required due date for the payment of all taxes and the display of license for calendar year 2000 shall be May 31, 2000. In all subsequent years the due date shall be as specified in section 18-53.

(Ord. No. 2014/11, 5-12-2014)

Sec. 18-53. - Registration required.

- (a) The owner, agent or legal representative of every business subject to this article, whether listed in the classification index or not, shall register the business and make application for a business license on or before May 31 of each year, except that a new business shall be required to have a business license prior to operation within the county. A license for a bar must be issued in the name of the individual who has been issued a state ABC license and will have actual control and management of the business.
- (b) Application shall be on a form provided by the license official which shall contain the social security number and/or the federal identification number, the South Carolina Retail License Number (if applicable), the business name as reported on the state income tax return, and all other information about the applicant and the business deemed necessary to carry out the purposes of this article by

- the license official. Applicants may be required to submit copies of state and federal income tax returns reflecting gross income figures.
- (c) The applicant shall certify under oath that the information given in the application is true, that the gross income is accurately reported, or estimated for a new business, without any unauthorized deductions, and that all assessments and personal property taxes on business property due and payable to the county have been paid.
- (d) Insurance agents and brokers shall report the name of each insurance company for which a policy was issued and the total premiums collected for each company for each type of insurance coverage on a form approved by the license official. An insurance agent not employed by an insurance company, or employed by more than one company, shall be licensed as a broker.
- (e) Every business, which either acts as an agent, broker or representative for any other person or has contractual arrangements with persons who are acting as independent contractors for it shall supply the following information: name, address, telephone number and estimated payments or premiums due to that person. Such information shall be supplied upon the request of the license official and shall be a condition precedent to obtaining the license required under this article.
- (f) Elimination of commercial waste. On the business license application form, each business shall fully disclose its method of solid waste handling and shall present proof of such solid waste disposal before a license is granted.
- (g) No business license shall be issued until the applicant first submits documents necessary to establish compliance with Beaufort County Zoning Ordinance, Building Code, and other regulatory codes as adopted by Beaufort County Council.
- (h) Any person desiring to peddle goods anywhere in unincorporated Beaufort County must first meet all regulations pursuant to the provisions of S.C. Code 1976, § 40-41-10 and are also subject to being in compliance with the zoning and building codes.
- (i) Miscellaneous sales (antique malls, flea markets or leased space sales). Any person leasing space for the sale of merchandise from an established business shall be required to have a business license, whether or not the sales are made through a central cash register. Futhermore, it shall be the responsibility of the leasor of the spaces to advise the business license office of persons leasing space.
- (j) Beaufort County shall not grant a business license to any applicant for a use identified in section 106-1098 of and regulated by section 106-1281 of Beaufort County's Zoning Development Standards Ordinance if such use shall be located within 500 feet of a residence, church, school or day care center.

(Ord. No. 2014/11, 5-12-2014)

Sec. 18-54. - Deductions and exemptions.

- (a) No deductions from gross income shall be made, except income from business done wholly outside of the county jurisdiction on which a license tax is paid to another county or a municipality, or income which cannot be taxed pursuant to state law. The applicant shall have the burden to establish the right to a deduction by satisfactory records and proof. No person shall be exempt from the requirements of this article by reason of the lack of an established place of business within the county, unless exempted by state or federal law. The license official shall determine the appropriate classification and licensing for each business. No person shall be exempt from this article by reason of the payment of any other tax, unless exempted by state law, and no person shall be relieved of the liability for the payment of any other tax by reason of the application of this article.
- (b) The provisions of this article shall not extended to those businesses which are contained within NAICS Major Business Group 01: agriculture production; crops, or Group 02: agriculture production; livestock and animal specialties, or Group 08: forestry, or Group 09: fishing, nor shall it apply to the

manufacture or sale of sea island grass products, but shall extend and apply to vendors of every other class and kind of goods.

Sec. 18-55. - False application unlawful.

It shall be unlawful for any person subject to the provisions of this article to make a false application for a business license, or to give or file, or direct the giving or filing, of any false information with respect to the license or tax required by this article.

(Ord. No. 2014/11, 5-12-2014)

Sec. 18-56. - Display and transfer.

- (a) All persons shall display the license issued to them under this article on the original form provided by the license official, in a conspicuous place, in the business establishment, at the address shown on the license. A transient or nonresident shall carry the license upon his person or in a vehicle used in the business readily available for inspection by any authorized agent of the county.
- (b) A change of address must be reported to the license official within ten days after removal of the business to a new location, and the license will be valid at the new address upon written notification of the license official and compliance with zoning and building codes. Failure to obtain the approval of the license official for a change of address shall invalidate the license and subject the licensee to prosecution for doing business without a license. A business license shall not be transferable, and a transfer of ownership shall be considered a termination of the old business and the establishment of a new business requiring a new business license, based on old business income.

(Ord. No. 2014/11, 5-12-2014)

Sec. 18-57. - Inspections and audits.

- (a) For the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this article the license official or other authorized agent of the county is empowered to enter upon the premises of any person subject to this article to make inspections and examine and audit books and records. It shall be unlawful for any person to fail or refuse to make available the necessary books and records. during normal business hours with 24 hours' prior written notice. If an audit or inspection reveals that false information has been filed by the licensee, the costs of the audit shall be added to the correct license tax and late penalties in addition to other penalties provided in this article. Each day of failure to pay the proper amount of license tax shall constitute a separate offense.
- (b) The license official may make random inspections of any businesses within the county to insure compliance with this article. Records of inspections and audits shall not be deemed public records. The license official shall not release the reported gross income of any person by name without permission of the licensee, provided that statistics compiled by classifications may be made public.
- (c) The license official, upon approval of the county administrator, may disclose gross income of licenses to the Internal Revenue Service, South Carolina Department of Revenue, Beaufort County Tax Appraiser and other county and municipal business license offices for the purpose of assisting tax assessments, tax collections and enforcement of the business license. Such disclosures shall be for internal, confidential and official use by these governmental agencies and shall not be deemed public records.

Sec. 18-58. - Assessments.

- (a) When any person shall have failed to obtain a business license or to furnish the information required by this article or the license official, the license official shall proceed to examine the records of the business or any other available records as may be appropriate and to conduct investigations and statistical surveys as he/she may deem appropriate to assess a license tax and penalties as provided in this article.
- (b) A notice of assessment shall be served by certified mail and any application for adjustment of the assessment may be made to the license official within five days after the notice is mailed or the assessment will become final. The license official shall establish by regulation the procedure for hearing an application for adjustment of assessment and issuing a notice of final assessment.
- (c) A final assessment may be appealed to county council only by payment in full of the assessment under protest within five days and the filing of written notice of appeal within ten days after payment pursuant to the provisions of this article relating to appeals to county council. With regard to assessments of insurance companies and brokers for nonadmitted insurance companies, the state association of counties is designated as the exclusive agent of the county and is empowered to utilize all procedures and actions authorized by ordinance or state law.

Sec. 18-59. - Delinquent license taxes.

For nonpayment of all or any part of the correct license tax under this article, the license official shall levy and collect a late penalty of five percent of the unpaid tax for each month or portion thereof after the due date until paid. If any license tax shall remain unpaid for 60 days after its due date, the license official shall issue an execution which shall constitute a lien upon the property of the licensee for the tax, penalties and cost of collection, and shall proceed to collect in the same manner as prescribed by law for the collection of other taxes. Upon identification of a delinquent account the director of business license or his/her designee has the authority to establish payment plans, revenue procedures, and reduce or waive penalties based upon the revenue procedures as adopted with this amendment.

Sec. 18-60. - Notices.

The license official may but shall not be required to serve or mail written notices that license taxes under this article are due, but he shall publish a notice of the due date in a newspaper of general circulation within the county three times prior to the due date in each year. With regard to providing notice to insurance companies and brokers for nonadmitted insurance companies that license taxes are due, the South Carolina State Association of Counties is designated as the exclusive agent of the county and is empowered to utilize all procedures and actions authorized by ordinance or state law. Failure to receive notice shall not constitute a defense to prosecution for failure to pay the tax due or grounds for waiver of penalties.

Sec. 18-61. - Denial of license.

The license official shall deny a license under this article to an applicant when the application is incomplete, contains a misrepresentation, false or misleading statement, evasion or suppression of a material fact, does not comply with all other applicable county ordinances, or when the activity for which a

license is sought is unlawful or constitutes a public nuisance. A decision of the license official shall be subject to appeal to county council as provided in this article. Denial shall be written with reasons stated.

Sec. 18-62. - Suspension or revocation of license.

When the license official determines that:

- (1) A license has been mistakenly or improperly issued or issued contrary to law;
- (2) A licensee has breached any condition upon which the license was issued or has failed to comply with the provisions of this article;
- (3) A licensee has obtained a license through a fraud, misrepresentation, a false or misleading statement, evasion or suppression of a material fact on the license application;
- (4) A licensee has been convicted of an offense under a law or ordinance regulating business, a crime involving moral turpitude, or an unlawful sale of merchandise or prohibited goods;
- (5) A licensee has engaged in an unlawful activity or nuisance related to the business; or
- (6) The business is not in compliance with all other applicable county ordinances;

The license official shall give written notice to the licensee or the person in control of the business within the county by personal service or certified mail that the license is suspended pending a hearing before county council for the purpose of determining whether the license should be revoked. The notice shall state the time and place at which the hearing is to be held, which shall be within 30 days from the date of service of the notice. The notice shall contain a brief statement of the reasons for suspension and proposed revocation and a copy of the applicable provisions of this article.

Sec. 18-63. - Appeals to county council.

- (a) Any person aggrieved by a final assessment, or a denial of a business license under this article by the license official may appeal the decision to county council by written request stating the reasons therefor filed with the license official within ten days after the payment of the assessment under protest or notice of denial is received.
- (b) An appeal or a hearing on revocation shall be held by county council within 30 days after receipt of a request for appeal or service of notice of suspension at a regular or special meeting of which the applicant or licensee has been given written notice. At the hearing all parties shall have the right to be represented by counsel, to present testimony and evidence and to cross examine witnesses. The proceedings shall be recorded and transcribed at the expense of the party so requesting. The rules of evidence and procedure prescribed by county council shall govern the hearing. The county council shall by majority vote of members present, render a written decision based on findings of fact and the application of the standards in this article which shall be served upon all parties or their representatives and shall be final unless appealed to a court of competent jurisdiction within ten days after service
- (c) No person shall be subject to prosecution for doing business without a license until the expiration of ten days after written notice of denial or revocation which is not appealed or until after final judgment of court upholding denial or revocation.

Sec. 18-64. - Confidentiality.

Except in accordance with proper judicial order or as otherwise provided by law, it shall be unlawful for any official or employee to divulge or make known in any manner the amount of income or any particulars set forth or disclosed in any report or return required under this article. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent the identification of particular reports or returns.

Sec. 18-65. - Classification rates and schedules.

- (a) The license tax for each class of business shall be computed in accordance with the rates set forth in sections 18-66—18-68 and the North American Industrial Classification System (NAICS)., except that, in cases of conflict between the provisions of the NAICS and this Code, the provisions of this Code shall prevail.
- (b) Unless otherwise specifically provided, all rates shall be doubled for businesses and itinerants having no fixed place of business within the county and triple for businesses located out of state.

Sec. 18-66. - Class 8 rates.

Each NAICS number designates a separate subclassification. The businesses in this section are treated as separate and individual subclasses due to provisions of state law, regulatory requirements, service burdens, tax equalization considerations, etc., which are deemed to be sufficient to require individually determined rates. Nonresident rates do not apply except where indicated.

15. 16. 17 Contractors, construction, all types. See the rate schedule in section 18-68.

- (1) For nonresident contractors, the total tax for the full amount of the contract shall be paid prior to issuing a building permit or commencement of work and shall entitle the contractor to complete the job without regard to the normal license expiration date. An amended report shall be filed for each new job and the appropriate additional license tax per \$1,000.00 of the contract amount shall be paid prior to commencement of new work. Only one base tax shall be paid in a calendar year. A trailer at the construction site, a home office or structure in which the contractor resides is not a permanent place of business under this article.
- (2) No contractor shall be issued a business license until all state and county qualification examinations and trade license requirements have been met. Each contractor shall post a sign in plain view on each job identifying the contractor with the job. In addition, each contractor shall furnish the license official with a list of all subcontractors furnishing labor or materials for each project.
- (3) Subcontractors shall be licensed on the same basis as general, prime or manager for the same job, and no deductions shall be made by a general or prime contractor or manager for value of work performed by subcontractors. General or prime contractors will be responsible and will pay for the business license of any subcontractor doing work on the project if the subcontractor is found to be operating without a county business license.
- (4) No contractor shall be issued a business license until all performance and indemnity bonds required by the county building code have been filed and approved. Zoning permits must be obtained when required by the county zoning ordinance codified in Chapter 106.

40 Railroad companies. See S.C. Code 1976, § 12-23-210.

41 Passenger transportation. On gross income, <u>appropriate</u> rate class—7 plus each vehicle per year, \$25.00.

- (5) Permission to use streets required. It shall be unlawful for any person to construct, install, maintain, or operate in, on, above or under any street or public place under control of the county any line, pipe, cable, pole, structure or facility for utilities, communications, cablevision or other purposes without a consent agreement or franchise agreement issued by the county council by ordinance which prescribes the term, fees and conditions for use.
- (6) Consent, franchise, or business license tax required. The annual fee for use of streets or public places authorized by a consent agreement or franchise agreement shall be set by the ordinance approving the agreement and shall be based on gross revenues derived from activities in the county, the length of lines installed in streets and public places, or other formula deemed appropriate by county council. No consent fee or franchise fee shall be construed to be in lieu of a business license tax based on gross revenue unless specifically provided by ordinance. Credits for business license tax paid may be applied to taxes set by ordinance granting consent or a franchise when specifically authorized by the ordinance.

481 Telephone companies not using public streets under franchise or consent. Establishments providing local or long distance telephone communications as described in North American Industrial Classification System (NAICS) 5733, including voice and data communications; radio telephone services; cellular telephone services; paging and beeper services; leasing lines, fiber optic cables, microwave or satellite facilities; selling access and reselling use of facilities or methods to others, shall pay an annual business license tax of 0.3 percent of gross receipts from all communications activities conducted in the county and for communications services billed to customers located in the county on which a business license tax has not been paid to another municipality.

4841 Television, cable or pay. Basic fee, consent or franchise.

491 493 Electrical and gas companies. Consent or franchise.

55 Automotive, motor vehicle dealers and farm machinery, retail. See the rate schedule in section 18-68.

- (1) One sales lot not more than 400 feet from the main showroom may be operated under this license provided that proceeds from sales at the lot are included in gross receipts at the main office when both are operated under the same name and ownership.
- (2) Gross receipts from this classification shall include full sales price without deduction for tradeins.
- (3) Dealer transfers shall not be included in gross receipts.

This shall be a special license issued only for special arts and crafts events sanctioned as such and be valid solely for the time period and the specific location stated thereon. This special license must be applied for and obtained before commencement of the event for which it is to be used.

It is the responsibility of the special events promoter or coordinator to ensure that all participating vendors are included in this special arts and crafts license.

Each participating vendor must be the creator of the art or craft which is to be sold. This includes any person who desires to engage in the business of offering for public sale flower arrangements or any hand-crafted item produced in the home. Goods purchased for sale or resale cannot be vended on this special license.

Inspections may be made on site during the sale.

Other merchants and vendors at such special events, not qualifying for this special license under arts and crafts, shall be required to obtain a regular business license.

Merchants and vendors now operating under valid licenses shall be allowed to operate on those licenses, incorporating such gross sales in the annual gross receipts to be reported on the succeeding year's application.

63 Insurance companies.

- (1) On gross premiums collected through offices or agents located in the county, wherever the risk is located in the county, or collected on policies written on property or risks located in the county, wherever the premiums are collected.
- (2) Gross premiums shall include new and renewal business without deductions for any dividend, credit, return premiums or deposit.
- (3) Solicitation for insurance, receiving or transmitting an application or policy, examination of a risk, collection or transmitting of a premium, adjusting a claim, delivering a benefit, or doing any act in connection with a policy or claim shall constitute doing business within the county whether or not an office is maintained therein. A premium collected on property or a risk located within the county shall be deemed to have been collected within the county.

631—632 Life, health and accident insurance. The rate is 0.75 percent of gross premiums. Declining rates shall not apply.

633—635 Fire and casualty insurance. The rate is two percent of gross premiums. Declining rates shall not apply.

636 Title insurance. The rate is two percent of gross premiums. Declining rates shall not apply.

6411-Brokers for fire and casualty insurers. The rate is two percent of gross premiums. Declining rates shall not apply. Nonadmitted: On gross premiums collected on policies of companies not licensed in the state, the broker shall collect and remit annually to the state association of counties, with a copy of the report required by the insurance commission showing the location of the risks insured. (Premiums for nonadmitted business are not included in broker's gross commissions for other business.)

Notwithstanding any other provision of this article, license taxes for insurance companies and brokers for nonadmitted insurers shall be payable on or before May 31 in each year without penalty. Pursuant to the S.C. Code 1976, § 5-7-300, the agreement with the state association of counties on

file with the clerk for collection of current and delinquent license taxes from insurers and brokers is approved.

BACKGROUND. Beaufort County issued a Request for Proposals from qualified firms to provide shell and core architectural, mechanical, electrical, plumbing (MEP) and civil engineering design services for the construction of a two story office building located on County owned property adjacent to the County's Myrtle Park Admin Complex. Two options were requested in the proposal: A two-story 15,000 sqft/per floor building and a two-story 20,000 sqft/per floor building. The following firms responded and provided proposals.

Beaufort Design Build LLC, Beaufort, SC LS3P, Charleston, SC

Glick Boehm & Associates Charleston, SC R. W. Chambers Architects, Beaufort, SC

The design proposal process differs from a typical construction bid, in that the proposers outline how they would accomplish the project within a specified fee. In this regard, proposals are reviewed on the basis of the value offered rather than solely on the losest price. A selection committee consisting of the Public Works Director, Facility Management Director, and CIP Construction Manager reviewed the original proposals. The selection committee asked all four proposers to prepare a Best and Final Offer to be presented at an interview. The selection committee met with Beaufort Design Build, Glock Boeh Architects and LS3P. R. W. Chambers Architects declined the invitation to present a Best and Final Offer.

On the basis of the qualification of the firm, understanding of the scope of services requested, recent and similar experience, in-house services and completeness and cost effectiveness of the fee, the selection Committee recommended a contract award to Beaufort Design Build, LLC in the amount of \$315,000.

FUNDING. The project will be funded by the Santee Cooper Economic Development Revolving Loan Program with the \$4.5 million loan fund balance in Acct #48070011-54430 – Site Development.

FOR ACTION. Community Services Committee Meeting on February 20, 2017.

RECOMMENDATION. The Community Services Committee approve and recommend to County Council approval of a contract award to Beaufort Design Build LLC to provide design services for a two-story office building adjacent to the County's Myrtle Park Admin Complex in the amount of \$315,000 funded by the source listed above.

 Complete for Most of Beaufort County
- ONLY storm debris from October 7 is allowed. CERES is seeing a trend of newer, "green" debris from routine landscape maintenance being set out for collection.



IMPORTANT NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC

Beaufort County advises residents to immediately **STOP** placing debris at the right-of-way. If you have not placed your debris at the right of way it is too late and the property owner is responsible for removal and proper disposal of any debris. The third and final pass began in most of Beaufort County on Tuesday, Jan. 3. Debris placed at the right-of-way after the third pass is complete for any area will not be picked up by County contractors and is prohibited by FEMA regulations and federal law. Contractors will continue picking up debris previously identified by the debris monitoring firm to complete the third pass in specific areas only.

Public and Private Road Debris

- Residents are asked to sort Class 1 and Class 2 debris into separate piles on the right-of-way at their residence for collection. The separation categories for debris placed at rights-of-way are:
 - Class 1 waste includes small limbs, leaves and landscape trimmings.
 - Class 2 waste includes building materials, drywall, lumber, carpet, furniture, mattresses and plumbing items.
- The County advises residents not to block fire hydrants, stormwater ditches or utility boxes when placing items at the right-of-way

Convenience Centers

- All Beaufort County Convenience Centers are accepting <u>limited</u> amounts of <u>non-storm</u> generated yard waste (Class 1)
- Class 1 waste accepted at Convenience
 Centers includes small limbs and landscape
 trimmings. Capacity for this material is
 limited. No trailers or large loads will be
 accepted. Residents who wish to drop off
 waste in bags should use paper bags. Plastic
 bags are prohibited

Private Road Debris (PPDR)






- January 23, 2017, CERES switches to a "punch list" system for collecting in these communities
- The County is divided into 74 similarly sized zones:
- 33 zones completed
- 35 zones have punch lists to be completed
- 6 zones are still active with 2nd/3rd passes

PPDR non-eligible debris piles

Below is the list with estimated quantities reviewed by CERES

- Fripp Island approximately 4000 yards of debris
- Dataw Island approximately 10,000 yards of mulch
- Moss Creek approximately 8,500 yards of mulch, and 5,750 yards of stumps and very large logs
- Rose Hill approximately 750 yards of stumps and logs that previous contractor could not grind and approximately 500 yards of brush

Marine Debris

- Boats, Docks, other debris obstructing the navigable waters
- The County questioned if this is the responsibility of the County, SC-DNR, SC-DHEC/OCRM, SC-EMD, or USACE
 - Both SC-EMD and FEMA are working with the County for answers
 - Both DNR and DHEC have sent letters to SC-EMD stating the responsibility is not theirs
 - Jan. 31, 2017 County received an opinion from the Attorney General's office stating the County has a legal responsibility to remove debris between Low and High tide, the Marsh
 - Additional clarification on the navigable waterways is still needed
 - The County is getting guidance on how to request approval from FEMA to begin work (still pending as of 2/17/17)

Marine Debris action to date

- SC-DNR and US Coast Guard did hazard removal in the navigable channels in the first days after the storm
- Efforts are ongoing by DNR to identify and inventory the vessels and debris
- County advertised for bids to be due 2/15/17.
 Activating the mutual aid agreement with ToHHI is another option.
 - SC-EMD and FEMA have stated we cannot change order the task to CERES.
 - Cost to remove is unknown at this time

Marine Debris Proposals

- 4 Statements of Qualifications and unit price proposals were received 2/15/17:
 - Arbor Tree & Land, Inc.
 - AshBritt Environmental
 - Crowder Gulf
 - DRC Emergency Services
- Selection committee meets 2/23/17
 - ToHHI representative will be a part of the selection



MS4 Infrastructure Debris

- Fallen trees, woody debris washed into and blocking ditches and pipes within County maintained easements
- Identification and Inventory is complete
 - NRCS staff on site today and tomorrow for assessment
 - Cost estimate \$524,036
- Pursuing USDA funding prior to submittal to FEMA as part of Public Assistance. Application was submitted on January 23, 2017
 - Allows 100% reimbursement for monitoring up to 7.5% of debris cost
- Follows same time frame as other debris
 - If awarded USDA funding, we have 220 days from the date of the agreement
























FEMA reimbursement Program

- The County is participating in a newer pilot debris program by FEMA
- Increases percentage of reimbursement during the first 90 days (85% first 30 days, 80% next 60 days, then 75% up to 180 days)
- Since DHEC and FEMA approved our debris plan in advance of the event, it increases reimbursement by 2%

Damage Assessment

- As of November 10, 2016 w/ Feb. 13, 2017 update:
- Countywide assessment is complete
- 1,055 parcels with damage (excl. HHI)
 - 71 with damaged structures >50% (excl. HHI)
- Estimated cost \$34,108,749
 - Does not include ToHHI's 19,688 parcels inspected. These numbers will not be available until next year when annual permitting reports are available to value cost of all permitted repairs
- County Building Inspection has issued 356 emergency related permits (414 building, 52 electrical)



Town of Hilton Head Island Damage
